In developing his points, Ohmart said that the whole idea of compulsory fees was against the basic fundamentals of American liberalism and right; that the compulsory program was unsporting. unfair, and unjustified and that any compromise suggestion on the part of the opponents must be eyed with skepticism.

Harrison, speaking first for the negative, explained the progress of extra-curricular activity supported by the students from its inception in 1901. "At this time," he explained, "the students of the University demanded extra-curricular activities. Since the state would not assume financial control, they decided to install a system on a self-taxation basis."
