U. O. Students Join Welcomed By **Nationwide Protest** Against War Today Oregon Players Slated For an Exhibition

University, High School **Speakers to Outline Peace Program Parade Is Planned** Peace Leaders Expect No Disorder in Display

Oregon students will participate today in a nationwide protest against the "method of war." Eugene is expected to add between 1000 and 2000 to the number who will meet this morning to declare · their denunciation of the god Mars. Probably a major part of the campus populace, in addition to the students bodies of Eugene high, University high, Northwest Christian college, and a throng of curious townspeople, will gather around the solemn, gray steps of the old libe at 11 o'clock this morning to lay open to the public their demand for a warless world

Speakers Scheduled

A half-dozen earnest speakers will be on the platform when the ceremonies get under opening way. Louise Clark, U. of O. student, is scheduled to start the protest with a short talk, "The Profiteers of War." Ed Luckey, Eugene high debater, will mount the rostrum second to attack America's unprecedented peace-time billion dollar military budget.



Boyer Receives News President C. V. Boyer received the communication from Elmer R. Goudy, administrator of the state emergency relief administration, stating that the committee had received notification of its usual grant of relief funds for student aid purposes for April, 1935.

Mr. Goudy said that the balance of the regular monthly allotment totaling \$2,643.75 was now avail able in addition to the preivous allocation of \$88.25, and this would allow the restoration of the 100 per cent program.


