chutes opened. Herve landed safely. Henigue was dead. Apparently he was killed in the collision and his parachute opened of itself.


Russia Parades Power



SALEM, Ore., May 1.-(UP)-For being AWOL from 16 of the 23 meetings held by the state board of higher education in the last two Gleeman Sing years, Mrs. Cornelia Marvin Pierce today was "court-martialed" off the board by Covernor Martin after a hearing.


