As the famous Lord Eldon said, "Okay kid, I'll see you at the Oregon law school dance."

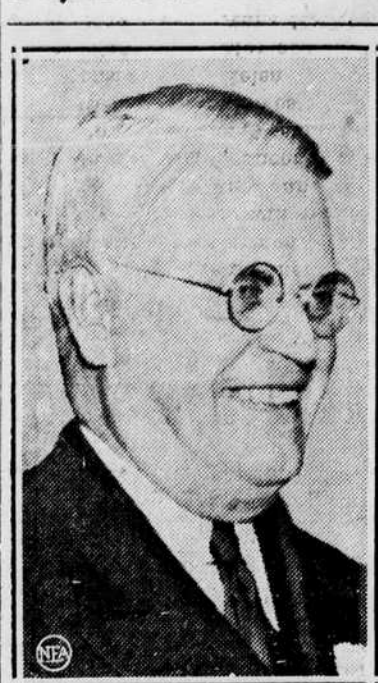

Miss Henry Praises Student Cooperatives

"A cooperative house means more to students than simply an interesting and comfortable place to live. Cooperatives can offer to people who are likely to be leaders—for they have for the most part been earning all or part of their own expenses, and have better than average initiative and willingness—an opportunity for promoting and directing cooperative movements outside of college. Members are exposed to cooperative practice and permitted to demonstrate their interest and willingness. Many become capable of directing and founding cooperatives in communities."

To Miss Elinor E. Henry, managing editor of The Cooperative Venture, cooperative student publication at the University of Washington, the above statements include the most significant results of the cooperative living system, which has proved successful on the Seattle campus, and is growing more and more important throughout the country.

Leaders Trained

A feature of the cooperative system in Washington is the speakers committee, which prepares students to discuss cooperative organization in their own and other communities. Miss Henry believes that this growing interest in communities, is preparing places for students to direct cooperative movements as a definite career after college. Many cooperative organizations have their eyes on student leaders in the movement and promise openings to qualified men and women when they have completed their college work.

"In writing and teaching cooperation there is a definite place for women," Miss Henry stated. "It happens that every student who has graduated from the Washington women's cooperative houses now has a good position. Some are teaching, some doing social service work. Probably this record is not due to the cooperative background entirely, but it seems to indicate that the type of girl who is attracted to the co-op is the kind who receives first choice."

Unfortunate Tie-up

It is a regrettable fact, in Miss Henry's opinion, that the term "cooperative" has an unpleasant connotation in the ears of some American people. So-called cooperatives not based on sound business principles frequently fail. Then, too, the most familiar type in this country is the producers' cooperative which frequently arrays itself against other groups for its own ends, resulting quite often in a monopoly that actually is opposed to the interests of the consumer. "We wish to stress consumers' cooperation—which will lead ultimately to production

by the consumer, of course," Miss Henry said.

Paper Published

The Cooperative Venture does not concern itself entirely with cooperative action on its own campus but devotes some space, also, to other cooperatives in the United States and in other countries. It acts as a clearing house of information from cooperatives at many other colleges.

contents that, no matter what the composition of society, within two generations it will stabilize itself, and there will be more or less normal distribution of all age groupings.

The main point in Wilbert Moore's review of "Pareto as a Sociologist" was that society must be governed by the elite, and that these elite tend to rise to the top because they can better manage the affairs of others. Pareto's contention is that the best form of government is dictatorship. Mussolini has accepted Pareto as his spiritual and intellectual adviser.

After much discussion, refreshments were served. The group meets again within two weeks.

Disability Will Delay Symphony Concert

While in Japan this summer, his elbow was damaged and a nerve was torn loose. The object of this operation was to transplant the nerve from the outer to the inner side of the joint and to insert a synthetic sheath in his arm.

Underwood at present is not suffering from the operation, but his arm is in a heavy cast and it will be several weeks before he is able to regain full use of it.

The program for the University symphony and the Eugene Junior symphony are being postponed until Mr. Underwood's arm is out of the cast and the Portland physicians have had an opportunity to pass upon its fitness.

It is expected that the University symphony will give its second concert the latter part of this term and that the Eugene Junior symphony will appear either the latter part of this term or early in the spring.

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Debris Evidence Of Sea Disaster

James Stovall Visits Scene of Iowa Wreck

James C. Stovall, instructor in geography, started out to visit a cranberry farm in Washington over the weekend in order to impart fuller knowledge to his geography classes, and ended up by visiting the scene of the wrecked Iowa, and partaking of biscuits made from flour salvaged from the ship.

Although Mr. Stovall considered it one of the most hair-brained trips he ever made, he brought back many interesting data. Many things have washed in from the Iowa which the "natives" living near Peacock spit have salvaged. Lumber covered with oil, and flour are two of the finds. Some people have carried away as much as a thousand pounds of flour.

"Many white gulls flying about are streaked with brown oil," Mr. Stovall said. "Some have so much gummed on their wings that they can't spread their feathers to fly, so just walk along the beach waiting for it to come off."

"The whole beach for some distance is a wavy line of matches from the wreck, which are being picked up and dried out. When run through your hair they are as usable as ever," he commented.

"A long bar reaches out from Peacock spit, and it is down around the end of this that the bodies have been washing ashore. Every high tide finds people lining the shore because there is a reward offered for each body, \$500 for the captain, because it is believed he still has \$8000 of the ship's money on his person."

The Iowa is only in about 36 feet of water, according to Mr. Stovall, and one can see waves roll over her decks at low tide.

Prof. Frederic S. Dunn will read his paper on "Four-Year-Old from a Two-Eared Jug" which he gave several weeks ago in Portland. The occasion in Portland was the celebration of the bi-millennium of Horace given under the auspices of the city library association in conjunction with the extension division of the University.

Professor Dunn also read this paper in Seattle at the recent session of the Classical Association of the Pacific States.

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
