Hale Accounts for 19 Points in Scoring Jamboree; Sammies, Gamma Hall Lose

A sharpshooting Abba Dabba "A" quintet adopted the theory that monopoly eliminates competition and blanked the haples Chi Psi cagers 38 to 0 in the opening encounter of last night's donut tils.

The Abba hoopment maintained a continuous attack throughout the game, ringing up 21 points in the first half, with an additional 17 points during the final session. The winners' scoring spree was led by Hale, forward, who sank nine field goals and one gift shot. Hale was seconded in his basket shooting efforts by Fred West, fellow forward, who collected eight points.

Wally Palmberg High Scorer

Stater Adds Up 72 Points in Six Games

This week's palm for high scoring goes to Wally Palmberg, Oregon State's bet for all-coast forward. The dynamic little sharp-shooter has piled up 72 points in seven games to place himself at the top of the scoring heap. In second place is Ward Howell, Oregon giant, who has counted 54 points in five games. Sammy Liebowitz rates third with 44 points.

On the basis of points per game, however, honors go to Bishop of Washington, who, in four games, has averaged an even 11 points. On the per game basis, Oregon's Howell rates second with 10.8, and Palmberg third with 10.3. In fourth place is Liebowitz (8.8), and in fifth, Holstine, Washington State, (8).

For total points scored, Holstine is tied up with Liebowitz for fourth place with his 44 points. Folen and Tuttle, Oregon State men, are right behind with 41 and 40 points respectively. Chuck Patterson, Oregon center, has made 29 points for a per game average of 5.8. He rates tenth in scoring and eleventh in percentages.

Duck Squad Rests Up for Week-End

Light Drill Scheduled For Today; Hobson Planning Changes In Friday's Lineup

Oregon's basketball Goliaths enjoyed a complete rest yesterday after hard workouts Sunday and Monday. The team is in top form and Coach Hobson is taking no chances on the lads going stale before the big series with Washington at the Igloo Friday and Saturday.

A light drill is slated for today and a brief tapering off session is scheduled for Thursday. A few of the Webfoots worked out with John Warren's frosh yesterday, but the regulars remained entirely away from Igloo boards.

Latest indications are that there will be a change in Hobson's starting lineup Friday night. Ken Purdy, Johnny Lewis, and Wayne Scott scintillated in scrimmages against the Ducklings and it is probable that one of the trio will draw the opening call at guard.

Purdy May Start

Purdy, a clever ball handler and long shot expert from Long Beach Junior college, has a shade over the others at present, and he may complete the opening lineup along with Rollie Rourke or Bill Courtney at the other guard; Chuck Patterson at center; and Sammy Liebowitz and Ward Howell, forwards.

Scott, transfer form Southern Oregon Normal, is another howitzer artist, while Lewis, a junior, was a regular during most of last season. Hobson has definitely decided to make a change in the lineup for the big series.

Oregon's hopes for a northern division title hang on the outcome of the two tussles. To stay in the running for the championship the Webfoots must take both games from the booming Huskies.

Washington has one of the best outfits ever turned out by Uncle Hec Edmundson, veteran tutor of scoring machines. The Huskies don't shine as individuals but as a team.

Huskies Are Good

Ralph Bishop, 6 foot, 4 inch, center, and Bob McKinstry, guard, are the only Washington players who are seniors. Ed Loverich, Chuck Wagner, and Bob Egge, the other Husky regulars, all have another season of competition. Bishop, successor to Bobby Galer in the scoring department, ran up 19 points against the Ducks in the Saturday night game at Seattle. He is the Husky captain and is a three-year veteran.

McKinstry, former teammate of Oregon's Johnny Lewis at Lincoln high of Seattle, is playing his first season as a regular, although he earned a letter two years ago as a reserve. Last winter he was out of action with a knee injury.

Egge and Wagner were regulars last year and Loverich was an alternate.

LUISSETTI IS HAILED AS GREATEST PLAYER BY STANFORD COACH
