Oregon ROTC Men May Have Chance For Active Duty

A number of reserve officers who have or will have received their commissions from the University ROTC unit, may have an opportunity to serve on active duty in the regular army, if funds are appropriated by congress to carry out the Thomson act.

This act authorizes the calling to active duty each year of 1000 reserve second lieutenants for military training. At the end of this period, 50 of these are given commissions in the army.

The Ninth Corps area, in which Oregon is located, has been allocated 45 infantry officers of the total number. Each school in the corps area will send a list of men for appointment to the corps area commander, who will make the final choices.

These lists will be arranged in the order of the men's military ability, with officers to be commissioned in 1936 given priority to those commissioned in 1935. A few other names will be included.

UO Education Plan Attracts Attention

Dean Onthank Is Called East to Describe Project Before Educators

Work under way at the University of Oregon in training student leaders, a new project in higher education, has attracted national attention and Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel, has been called to the University of Minnesota to describe the Oregon plan in detail before a number of educators, it was announced here today by Dr. C. Valentine Boyer, University president.

Dean Onthank, who has had charge of the courses here, will leave the latter part of this week for Minneapolis. The invitation to appear there was extended by Dr. Lotus D. Coffman, president of the University of Minnesota.

Dr. Coffman noted an account of the work which recently appeared in the Journal of Higher Education, national publication, and he invited Dean Onthank to come east to present the plan in detail.

In the article Dean Onthank described two classes conducted here, one for students who are presidents of fraternities or other living organizations, and the other for students who have charge of the study program in the groups. Both courses have shown good results and have been successful in every way.

Dean Onthank will spend the week of April 20 to 25 in Minneapolis describing the Oregon plan to educational leaders and experts.
