Dean Onthank Plans Trip East Soon for Meeting Of Directors .

Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel and state administrator for NYA, will leave for Washington in the near future to attend a meeting of all state NYA directors May 19, 20, and 21.

Although no announcement has been made as yet, it is reported that \$75,000,000 has been allotted to the Youth Administration a compared with \$50,000,000 last year. This means that, in all probability, educational aid for high school and college students will be continued.

Dean Onthank was appointed to his post of state NYA director some months ago. He has since devoted half of his time to his personnel work here at the University and the remainder to NYA activi-

The University of Oregon track and field squad began an intensive drill this week following the defeat handed them by Hec Edmundsen's Washington Huskies Saturday. The powerful Washington team won 74 to 57.

The Huskies grabbed off nine firsts and made a clean sweep of all three places in both the high and low hurdles.

Two Records Toppled

Two new records were put or the boards Saturday. "Squeak Lloyd, Duck ace, made a record broad jump of 24 feet 3% inches. The old record of 24 feet 3 inches was established by Dan Kelley in
