New OSC Program Similar To UO Reorganization

Reorganization of Oregon State College's student body program will follow a plan similar to that being used at the University, an announcement from President G. W. Peavy of Oregon State college indicated.

Intercollegiate athletics will be administered by an athletic manager, to be appointed by a governing board of nine faculty alumni and student members.

Similar to the University plan, Oregon State will have a separate board to rule over such extra-curricular activities as publications, forensics, and dramatics.

Initiation to Be Saturday With Professor Lowie As Speaker

Phi Beta Kappa, national scholastic honorary, elected eight seniors to membership yesterday afternoon. The newly-chosen members are, with their grade point averages:

To Robert Freed Bales, Wallowa, with an average of 3.91, went the Phi Beta Kappa award of \$25 in books made annually to that sophomore with the highest grade point average. Bales is a social science major.

The eight seniors who were voted the highest scholastic honors will be initiated Saturday, May 23. The initiation will be held in Gerlinger hall, in connection with the initiation of Sigma Xi, science honorary.

Dr. Robert H. Lowie, professor of anthropology at the University of California, will be the principal speaker at a joint banquet of the two societies in John Straub Memorial hall after the initiations.

Born in Vienna, Professor Lowie is a member of both Sigma Xi and Phi Beta Kappa. He holds a degree from the College of the City of New York, and has a doctor of philosophy degree from Columbia university. Professor Lowie is an ethnologist and has worked in anthropology, besides being the author of several books on scientific subjects. Topic for his address has not yet been announced.

The eight students chosen yesterday complete the number who will be admitted to the honor for this year. Six outstanding seniors, Bill Hall, Mary McCracken, Marjorie Sumpter, Ann-Reed Burns, Andy Newhouse, and Charles Reed, were elected to the honor.

The summer courses in law have been increasingly popular during the last few years and have enabled students to secure instruction in subjects which, under the limitations of the University's budget, could not be given every year as a part of the regular curriculum.

Salzman gave a series of tests of suggestion to 50 University students who volunteered to act as subjects for the experimental study. Two types of tests were given, those when students were wide awake and suggestions that they were falling or making some other movement were made to them, and those when the subjects were in a trance similar to sleep. Students were put in this trance when they were asked to concentrate on a light or to listen to a sound while some one verbally suggested sleep to them, until they finally went to sleep. A measure of suggestibility is found in the length of time it takes to get them to close their eyes and the soundness with which they sleep.
