#### Dr. Moore Gives Lecture On Japan for Sigma Xi

Dr. A. R. Moore, professor of biology, spoke on his experiences in Japan before a meeting of Sigma Xi, science honorary, last Tuesday evening. He was visiting professor of biology at the Tohoku Imperial university at Sendai from April, 1933, to March, 1934, after receiving a subsidized professorship from the Rockefeller founda-

Dr. Moore illustrated his talk with picture slides of the people, their schools, homes, and some of their work, which he took while in Japan. He discussed his views on the structure of the protoplasms 42 points. about which he has prepared a paper for Scientia, monthly international review of science, published at Milan, Italy. Professor C. B. Beall of Oregon translated the article into French for the journal.
