

Miss Wright startled the "second story man" in the corridor. she was surprised by his appearance in the forbidden territory and quaried him concerning his motives.


The potential burglar said he was looking for a girl and explained "his feet were wet so he left his shoes downstairs." "You can't stay up here," Miss
