

S. Smith Elected OCF Chairman At Conference

Paddock Made Student Member of Directors; 375 Consider Effective Liberalism Vote

At a "convention for progressive political action" held Saturday in Portland under the auspices of the executive committee of the Oregon Commonwealth federation, S. Stevenson Smith, professor of English at the University was unanimously elected chairman.

Incorporated as the Oregon Commonwealth Federation, the new progressive bloc decided not to launch itself as a new political party, but also steered clear of any alliance with old parties. Independent political action through progressive candidates and progressive legislation is its aim, according to the program.

Paddock Is Named

Monroe Sweetland, young progressive who recently directed a tour of representatives of Spanish democracy, became first executive secretary of the federation. A large board of directors, representing widely varying organizations, was elected, including, from the student section, Charles Paddock, University of Oregon.

The 375 persons assembled at the meeting met to consider the objective of "making liberal vote effective" with pleas for ownership of natural monopolies by the government.

In its education plank the federation called for democratization of the state board of higher education to include representatives of labor and the people at large; complete academic freedom for teachers and students; abolition of tuition fees; and complete demilitarization of the campus.

Public ownership of power and other natural monopolies, as well as of natural resources, was advocated. Mortgage moratoriums and wealth taxes were also part of the program. Nationalization of munitions, opposition to fascism, and support of democratic peoples in their struggle for democracy was included in the peace plank.

R. R. Hewitt, Salem, speaker of the day, pointed out that American youth of today have met the challenge of cost of production, labor problems and distribution of wealth, with organization of their groups.

Hewitt also made a plea for freedom of the press without suppression by strike leaders and monopoly bosses.

Herbert E. Barker, president of the central labor council, Salem, defeated S. P. Davidson, of the Carpenters' union, Salem, for the vice-chairmanship.
