

A long-felt need will be answered if the proposal to make the University articulate is approved by the state board of higher education, from which source must come the necessary funds. The University, hitherto voiceless, except for a limited weekly time on the air. would be in a position to render a maximum of service, through providing a medium of expression for all departments, including music, speech, journalism, science, extension, and all the rest.

That there is emphatic public and student demand for services available only through the medium of radio, was the statement made yesterday by W. A. Dahlberg, assistant professor of speech, who said that the University is under present conditions unable to meet this demand.


