## Big-Time' Broadcast On National Hookup Cancelled by Pontiac

Program Cancellation After December 31 Is Wandering Dogs Due to Drastic Budget Reduction, Pontiac Representative Wires

Plans for the "big-time" Pontiac Varsity show broadcast from the University were brought to a halt by the receipt of a telegram to Dr. C. Valentine Boyer, University president, from the Pontiac corporation, stating that due to lack of funds, the broadcasts scheduled after December 31 would be cancelled.

The telegram received Thanksgiving day by Dr. Boyer reads: Regret exceedingly to advise you

that unforeseen and drastic reductions in Pontiac's advertising budget have compelled Pontiac to cancel all varsity show radio programs scheduled after December 31. This means that Pontiac cannot carry out its intention to broadcast from the University of Oregon on January 21 and the purpose of this wire is to halt any preliminary activities that might be under way. 
