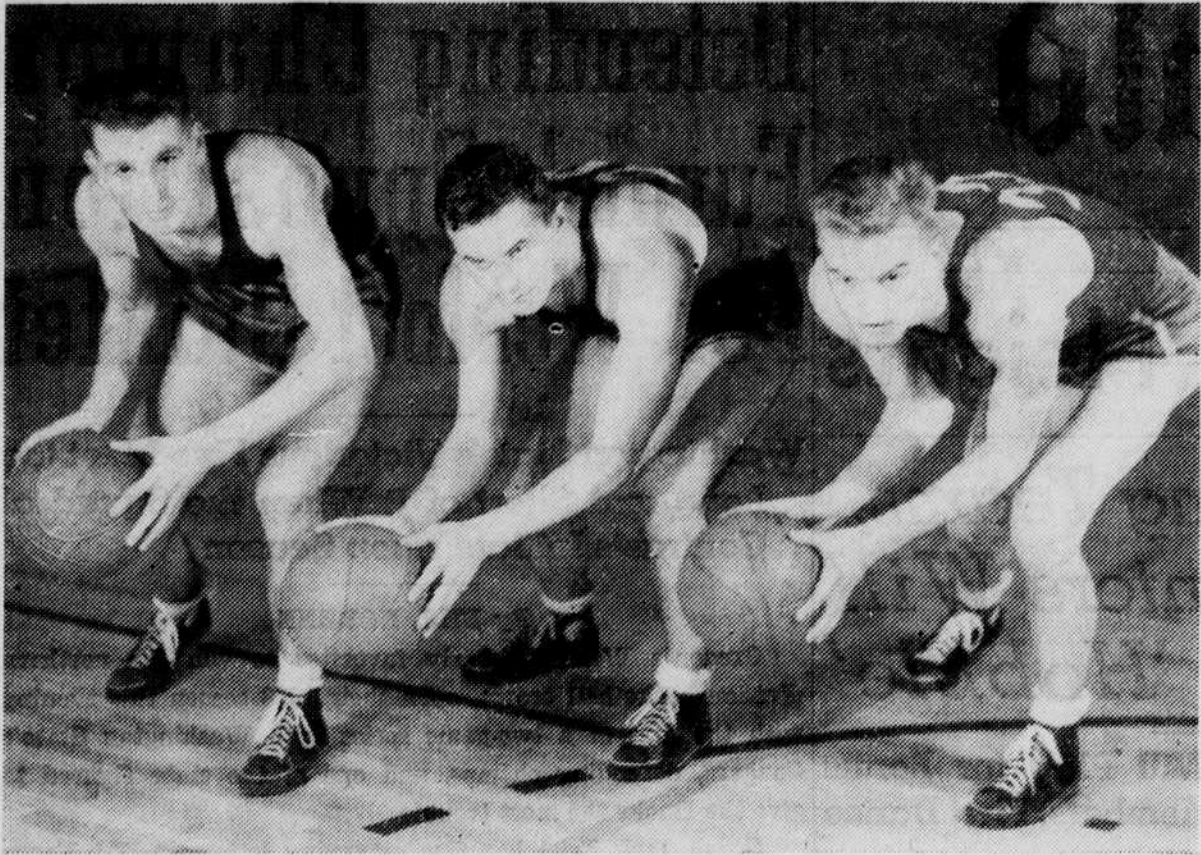


Donut Sports Will Swing Out Monday

Large Program For Term Is Announced By Intramural Head
