Love and Marriage Sessions Will Open On January 7 With Minister's Talk

"How to Be Happy Though Married" will be the theme of the first of the seventh annual "Love and Marriage" series to be given by the Rev. John W. Beard of the Mt. Tabor Presbyterian church of Portland on January 12 in Villard hall.

Other features of the series will be lectures by Dr. Jesse L. Brodie, Portland physician, on the biological approach to marriage and one by Dr. Lester Beck of the University faculty, on the psychological approaches.

The final lecture on the subject will be given in Gerlinger hall on February 8, when Dr. Paul Penelope, director of the Los Angeles Institute of Family Relations, will talk to students at an assembly to be followed by an open forum in the alumni room of the hall.

Machine Gets Boot From UO Librarian

It's "down with machines" in the main circulation lobby of the University library, according to Miss Bernice Rise, circulation librarian, as she announces the discontinuation of use there of the charging machine for checking out books.

Under last term's system which was a new experiment for the library, anyone presenting a card could be charged with a book. The number on the identification card was stamped on the cards of the book by the charging machine. It was easy to check out books on another person's cards. Difficulties arose out of this arrangement due to the fact that students incurring fines on borrowed cards often refused to pay them, Miss Rise explained.

This term's charging system is a combination of new and old methods, Miss Rise says. To borrow a book one must present his identification card, sign the cards of the book to be taken out with name and address, and check these with the library attendant. Townspeople who wish to check out books must also have identification cards with them each time they take a book. Reserve books, however, are still checked by the charging machines.

Printers May Stall Papers For Portland

Publishers Threaten To Stop Publishing; Union May Strike

PORTLAND—Jan. 6—With possible strike action in the offing, dispute between the typographical union and the three Portland daily newspapers continued last night although further developments have not yet appeared. Publishers of the papers threaten to suspend publication in the event of a strike rather than to back down.

Wage scales, the points in question, have been revealed in this standing: the union demands \$9 for seven hours of work; the papers refuse to offer more than \$9 for seven and one-half hours.

Some observers are venturing that a settlement will be made without trouble, regardless of present statements from the opposed factions.

Also Strike

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6—In other strike circles, water-front employers appeared confident that the Seattle port labor dispute will not spread along the coast.

At the scene of the trouble a department of labor conciliator promised an early conference for quick settlement. The present dispute resulted when longshoremen and operators each accused the other of not abiding by the contract.

Recession?

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6—Present business recession will be short-lived, William Knudsen, president of General Motors testified in the investigation of the senate unemployment committee. In response to questioning he maintained that his company could not use a \$450,000,000 surplus to avoid the recent lay-off of 30,000 men. Such a policy would not be "good business," he claimed.

Quite a Tax

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6—Income taxes of \$1,438,627 are being demanded from the Andrew W. Mellon estate for an alleged deficiency in 1931. The government previously lost before the board of tax appeals in a case asking for \$2,089,261 for the same year.
