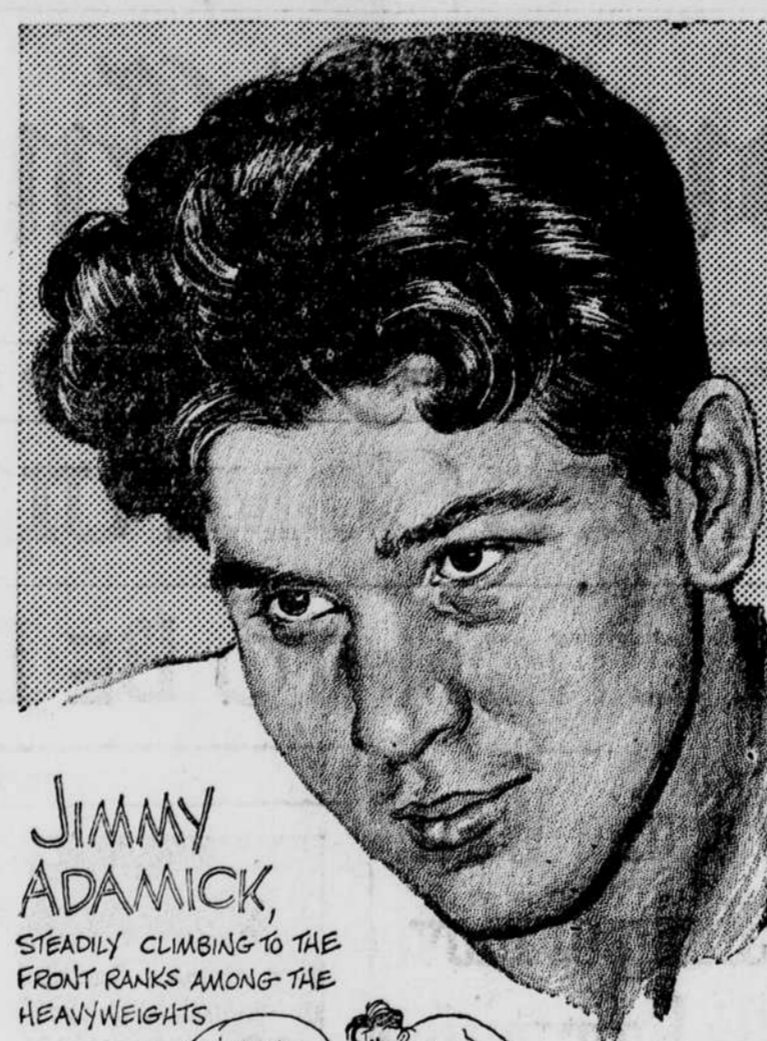

The chances, if the dopsters can be believed, would greatly favor a positive answer to this question, but with Earl Sandness high scoring forward sick, the chances of John's charges are lessened.

Sandness was absent from practice with a bad cold yesterday, but is expected to be in the lineup by game time tonight.

Coach Warren sent the team through a light drill yesterday in preparation for the impending battle. The baby Ducks who have been successful in most of their games to date are pointing for the OSC Rooks game next Friday, Warren indicated.

This game will mark the first battle in the annual "Little Civil War" and will be played in the Igloo.

The Ducklings have a slight edge in games won, but the Rooks boast of one of the strongest teams in years, with Clayton Shaw from Walla Walla high school in Washington and Mal Blackburn of Grant leading point gatherers.

No admission will be charged for the Santa Clara game this evening.

Laddie Gale Approaches Division Scoring Record; Tallies 56 on Road Trip

Wally Johansen Climbs to Fifth Place; Bill Lazetich Overtakes Ross Werner; Now in Second Place; Belko Fourth

Pouring 25 points through the hoop in the second Montana-Oregon game at Missoula Tuesday night, Lauren "Laddie" Gale, Oregon's rangy junior forward, climbed to within palming distance of Wally Palmberg's northern division scoring record of 187 points.

"The Lad," setting a pace that is leaving the rest of the league's dead-eyes floundering in his wake, leads his nearest pursuer by 46 points. His 32 points in the Montana series gave him a total of 134 points or an average of 13.4 per game at the halfway mark of the 20 game season.

Gale needs a nine point game average for the next six contests to shatter the former Oregon State all-American's 16-game total. If he continues at his present clip, he will surpass Palmberg's record in the next four games by .6 of a point—13.4x4 equals 53.6 and 53.6 plus 134 equals 187.6.

Almost equal to Gale's spurt was big Bill Lazetich's rapid rise through the ranks. The burly Montanan tossed 17 points in the first Oregon game and 20 in the second in his little duel with Laddie to take second place from Ross Werner, Washington captain. Lazetich has scored 88 points while Werner has totaled 81.

Harry Lockhart of Washington holds fourth place with 80, followed by Wally Johansen, Oregon, 77; Steve Belko, Idaho, 76; and Slim Wintermute, Oregon, 75.

Coach Howard Hobson's boys also top the circuit in offensive play. The Ducks have looped 500 points in ten games, an average of 50 points per contest. Montana is in second with an average of 425 and Washington in third with 415. Idaho's Vandals have usurped Oregon State's heritage, rating as the best defensive squad in the circuit. The Vandals have only had

334 points scored against them for a 22.4 average while the Beavers trail slightly with a 34.8 average in this department.
