"Washington folded with the score at 30-all and we went to town. We ran their legs off to the knees," and the way he said it you knew he meant it.

He is John Dick, hefty reserve forward on the Oregon squad, and he was talking about the recent Washington-Oregon series which took place in Seattle.

Oregon, you will remember, lost the first one by three points, 40 to 37, but came back to win 51 to 31 the next night.

The explanation of the first night is that the Ducks lost Bobby Anet after seven minutes of the game had been played, and Wally Johansen went out, also via the foul route, a little while later.

Losing Anet and Johansen this way took the core of the Webfoots' fast break. To heap on top of all this, they also lost Dave Silver, backboard ace and Laddie Gale, highpowered forward.

Losing Anet and Johansen would be excuse enough for a fast break team to lose, but losing two of their major scoring threats is enough to throw any team off stride.

The next night they didn't lose their men so quickly. It was an even ball game up to where the score was tied at 30-all as John mentioned. Then the Ducks went to town, scoring 20 points in 10 minutes, while holding their opponents to a measly one—a foul shot.

Not only that, but Coach Howard Hobson and his crew of sharpshooters are slightly disgruntled at a certain L. H. Gregory for certain statements made by Mr. Gregory concerning the ball game.

Mr. Gregory charged the Oregon hoopers with changing their tactics in the last 10 minutes of the second game, from a fast break to a set-up system.

Putting it in his own words, he said, "Right there the Webfoots quit trying to run Washington to death and began to set their plays on the Huskies and wait an opening."

Right here is where Hobby and his boys come into the picture.

Hobby says that they never changed the style of ball that they were playing—except for a few minor game changes—on the whole road trip.

Dick said the same thing, "We went fast-break, and if that didn't work we set them up, just like we've been doing all season."

Gregory himself disputed his own statements a little later when he said, "Johansen started it with a fast break almost the length of the floor as he saw a chance to break away to whisk one in from under the basket."

Then Hobby says, that the Huskies looked more exhausted than we did.

Gregory more or less verifies this when he says, "At that point Uncle Hec Edmundson gave up and sent in a team of Husky seconds."

The "at that time" that Gregory refers to is at the end of the first five minutes of the Oregon rally.

Of course it is possible that Hec did figure that the game was lost. Washington was behind 42 to 30 with Oregon running up that 12-point lead in five minutes, but the whole situation takes on a different light when you heard Hobby say that the Huskies appeared to be more tired of the two teams.

More of the same light is shed on the subject when you hear both Dick and Hobson say the same thing at a different place and at a different time.

Then, to finish up, Hobby says, "Are we going to run against Washington? Certainly."

Somehow or other we believe that Hec and his boys are in for a very tiring two days here Monday and Tuesday—days which may see the Huskies lose a couple of very important ball games.

Former Oregon Star Leaves Pendleton For Position

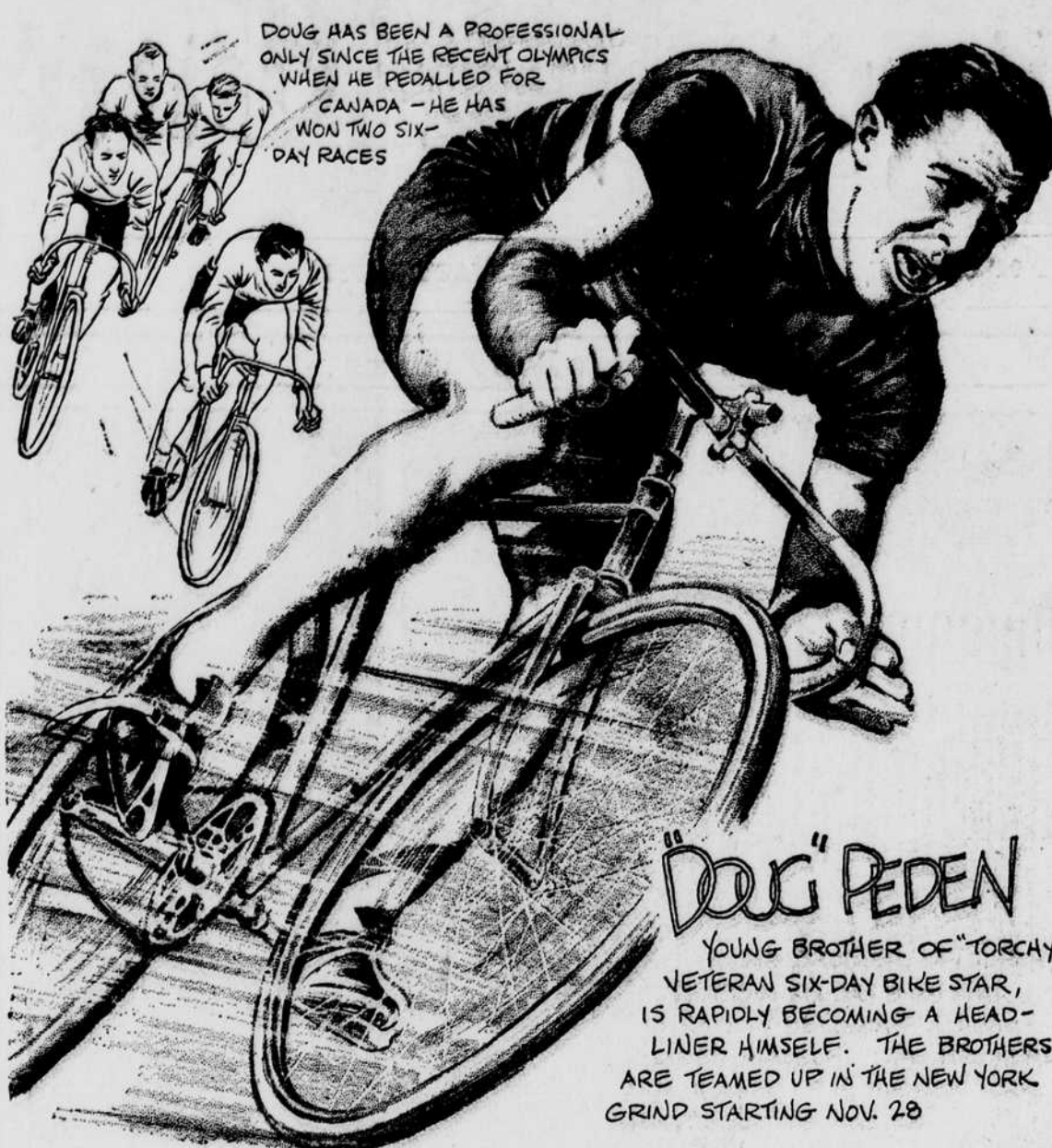
Mark Temple, former Oregon grid star and more recently head coach at Pendleton, has been selected to succeed Beryl Hodgen as football coach of The Dalles high school.

Temple was a former all-coast halfback and co-captain of the 1934 Oregon eleven, and later played professional football.

Pendleton, under the guidance of Temple for the past three years, won the Blue Mountain championship in 1934 and were co-champs last year. One of Temple's contributions to football fame is Jay Graybeal.

Hodgen retires to enter the pea farming business.

Hodgen, also a former Oregon halfback, has been head coach at The Dalles for the past nine years. Previous to this, he coached University freshman teams for one year. The football teams under his tutelage at The Dalles won 56 games, lost 19, and were tied twice. The basketball teams went to the state tournament five out of Hodgen's eight years.

Beavers Warm Up in Last Half to Win From Huskies

Jumping into an early lead, holding that lead at half-time, and turning on the power in the last half, Oregon State's hefty Beavers dented the dope bucket yesterday when they defeated the University of Washington, 43 to 28.

Leading only 14 to 12 at the half, the Beavers, led by Mal Harris, high point man for the evening with 14 points, went to town in the last half to outscore the Huskies, 29 to 16.

The State zone defense kept the Huskies' shots way out most of the game. The half-time score was the closest Washington came to tying the score.

Roy Pflugrad and Chet Kebbe tallied eight points each to place second in the OSC scoring column. Harry Lockhart, diminutive forward, led the Washington scorers with 9 points.

Driving Ducks Prepare For Return Engagement Of Washington Huskies

Hobson Slated to Start Wintermute, Silver, Anet, Johansen, Gale; Voelker, Lockhart, Dorsey, Malemutes, to See Action

L. H. Gregory says it can't be done. Coach Howard Hobson contends that it can, and Monday and Tuesday nights when the University of Washington invades McArthur court, Hobby's Oregon Ducks will be out to prove to the sports world in general and Lemon and Green backers in particular that they can beat the "Master" at his own game—in short, outrun him.

If the Webfoots can outrun and outlast the Husky pack from Seattle in their two games at Eugene, they will be over the hump and blazing down the second half "stretch" with enough lead to tide them over many a rough spot in the final sprint for the flag.

With Oregon holding only a one game lead over Washington at the halfway mark of the 20-game schedule, the outcome of these two games should do much toward deciding which northern division club will be "Berkeley-bound" when March rolls around.

Hobby's boys split their first series with the Huskies on the plywood court of the Seattle pavilion, winning the second game 51 to 31 after dropping the first contest, 40 to 37. Fans who saw these games report that at the end of the series it was the Huskies who were showing signs of wear and tear.

Air Force Exams Will Be Given on Campus

Members of the army board will be in Eugene March 7, 8, and 9 to interview prospective candidates for the U. S. army corps. Colonel E. V. D. Murphy, head of the University ROTC, announced last night.

Due to a drive to increase the air force, practically all candidates who qualify can be appointed to the training center at Randolph Field, San Antonio, Texas, army officials said.

Candidates must be between the ages of 20 and 27, and must pass a rigid physical examination. If they have had two years of college, a mental exam will be waived. Murphy said. Transportation is furnished to and from the training center.

Training lasts approximately one year, and the cadet satisfactorily completing the course will have an opportunity to be appointed as an airplane pilot and receive his wings. Cadets may be called into service with the regular army air corps.
