

Jones Leads DUs to Win; 4 Tilts Played

Only one other man even hit the ball, Jones setting down 14 on strikeouts.

The DUs meanwhile landed on Thornber for 13 runs in three big innings, the third, fourth, and fifth. Jones, besides winning his game in the field, led his teammates at the plate, with two home runs and a double in four trips. Knott got a circuit clout also, while Grabb and Morris both got three hits in four trips.

In the seventh the Omegas scored when Kidder was safe on an error, Shimomura singled, and Meyer cleaned the bags with a home run.

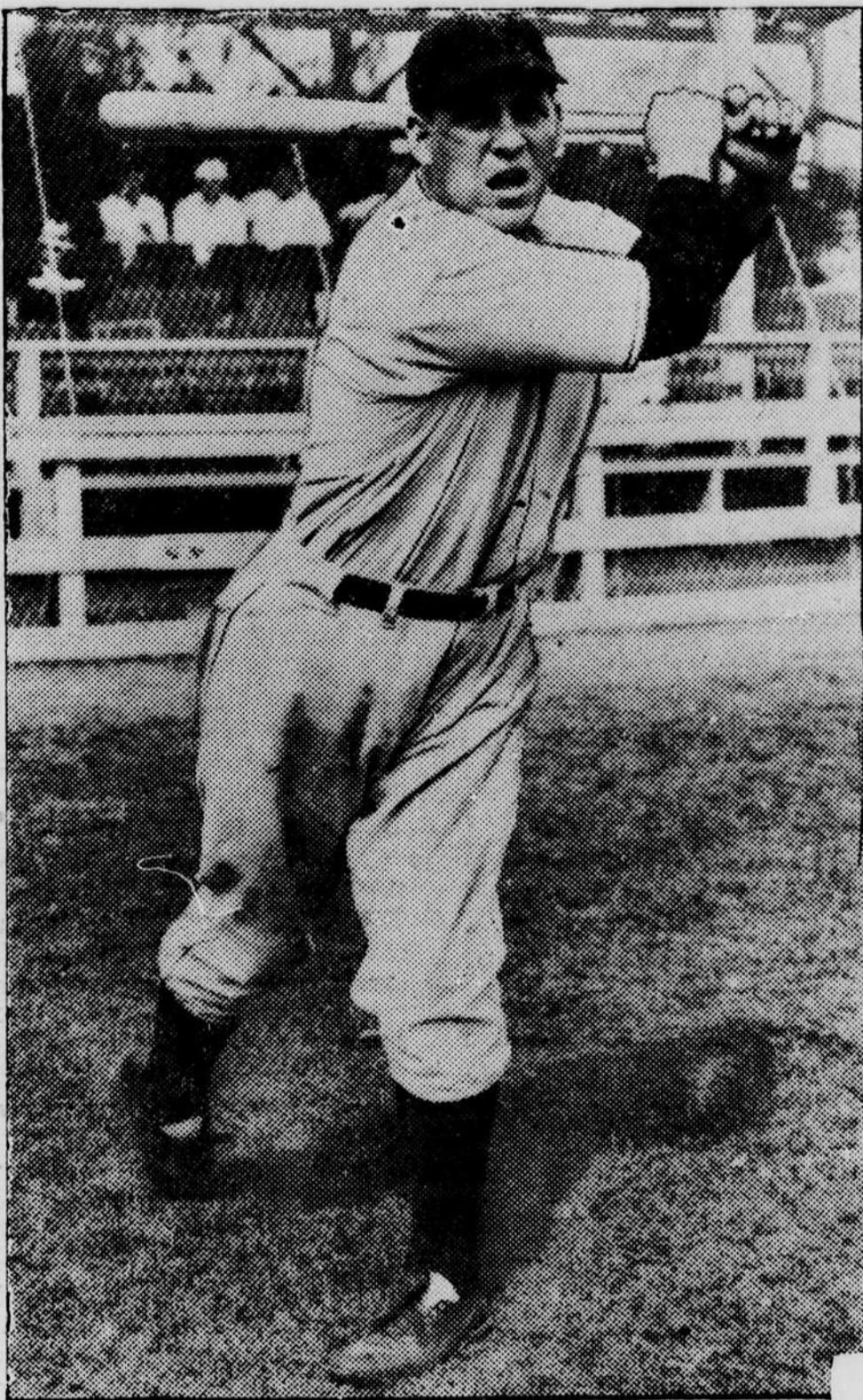
