

# Ducks Take Opener From Beavers, 4-1

## Burly Bob Creighton Hurls Four-hit Ball To Quell Orangemen

Wimpy Quinn Hits Fluke Home Run to Send Ducks Into Lead; OSC Scores on First Inning Infield Mixup, Error

Burly Bob Creighton, Oregon's powerful right arm flinger, treated about 2,000 opening day customers with four-hit baseball in a smooth contest on Howe field yesterday afternoon.

The speedballer from Tiburon, California set Oregon State's smooth-fielding Beavers down, 4 to 1, with some beautiful chucking, and was robbed of his shutout only by a mix-up in the Oregon infield in the first inning.

It was the season's first northern division game, and started Oregon's defending champs off on the right trail for about the fourth consecutive season.

### Meet Today

The clubs meet in Corvallis today, with another gala opening parade and ceremony on tap. Southpaw Bob Hardy for Oregon will probably oppose Earl McKinney on the mound.

Ralph Takami, who had won two of Oregon State's seven pre-season games on the mound, worked against the Webfoots, yielding nine scattered hits.

Two of them proved disastrous in the first inning when Wimpy Quinn bounced a liner over Left Fielder Al Petrella's head on one hop, and traveled the circuit with Gale Smith ahead of him.

Quinn doubled to left on a similar hit in the third, and scored Oregon's third run when Jack Gordon, Duck shortstop, rapped a two-baser through shortstop.

### Bonney Triples

Creighton yielded his first hit in the fourth inning when Bob Bonney, clean-up hitter for the Beavers, poked a triple against the right field bank. Oregon State's other three hits came in the fifth, seventh, and eighth innings.

Oregon State's lone run in the first off Pitcher Creighton came without a hit and was unearned.

Lead-off batter Rod Simms drew a walk, and was advanced when Bill Meyer, shortstop, layed down a neat bunt which Wimp Quinn handled in time to toss him out at first. Meyer advanced to third when Arland Schwab rolled out, second to first.

Bob Bonney, clean-up batter, then lifted a high fly which hovered over pitcher's box. Wimpy Quinn called for the ball but erred when Arland Schwab rolled out, on base and pitcher's box.

### Perfect Support

Creighton was given perfect support by his mates through the full nine innings from then on, the Coleman to Gordon to Smith combination coming up with a fast double killing in the seventh to nullify Takami's line single to center.

Over 250 Boys From 17 Schools Engage in Bill Hayward's Second Promotion

Over 250 track and field performers representing 17 of western Oregon's leading high schools will take part in the second annual running of the Hayward relays this afternoon on Hayward field. The first event will begin at 2 o'clock.

Colonel Bill Hayward, Oregon's venerable track coach, who inaugurated the meet last year, will personally supervise the meet. The relays have almost tripled in importance in the last year. In 1937 only six teams participated.

Medford high school, whose coach is Bill Bowerman, Oregon athlete of a few years ago, will have the largest representation. The Pearpickers have entered 27 men.

### Indians Win First

Favored with Medford are Salem and Eugene high schools, the Chemawa Indian school, defending champs, and Hill Military academy.

Beaverton, Milwaukie, Sweet Home, Lebanon, Vernonia, Maupin, Hill, Molalla, Chemawa, Salem, Corvallis, Springfield, Cottage Grove, Medford, Roseburg, Eugene, and University high of Eugene are the 17 high schools which will be represented.

Relay events scheduled follow: 440-yards, sprint medley, distance medley, mile, three-mile, shot put, javelin, and high jump.

Ray Hendrickson, University high athletic director, is in charge of the meet.

### Washington State Bests Local Ten; W. Gieseke Best Duck
