Athletes Don't Burn Out, Says Indiana Coach

Athletes don't burn out, says Sid Robinson, Indiana's cross-country coach; that is, if proper training rules are followed during their lives.

Robinson has been studying in the physiological laboratories at Harvard the past two years, working toward his Ph.D. While there he aided in carrying on physical fatigue examinations with such well-known trackmen as Don Lash, Tommy Deckard, Charley Hornbostel, Glenn Cunningham, Archie San Romani, Gene Venske, and Chuck Fenske.

It was found that these men, when performing exhausting work on a treadmill, had super-normal capacities for oxygen consumption, and very strong hearts.

Doctors have averred, says Robinson, that the cases of athletes burning out are vastly exaggerated in number and that of the thousands of athletes entering life after graduation each year, only a scant few are impaired in health. The rest are bettered for their competition.

Grandstand to Have Larger Seating Unit

Construction Will Be Completed in Two Months

Construction is scheduled to begin November 16 on the Hayward field grandstands, it was announced yesterday by J. O. Lindstrom, University business manager.

Approximately three thousand seats will be added to the present grandstand, bringing the total seating capacity up to 18,279. The present seating capacity is only 15,279, Lindstrom said.

Designs for the project have been approved by the government. The work will be done as a PWA project.

Total cost of the operations will be \$32,000, Lindstrom said, with \$17,600 coming as an outright grant from the PWA. The remainder will be paid by the ASUO athletic board.

The first part of the construction will extend the east end of the grandstand south 107 feet and add approximately 1700 seats.

As the second part of the project, a new roof will be put over the west end and a new press box will be built. Thirteen hundred additional seats will be available under the new roof.

Mr. Lindstrom stated the reason for the enlargement of the stadium is to handle the increased crowds at the OSC game, and to provide better seats for all games. The work is scheduled to be finished in about two months.

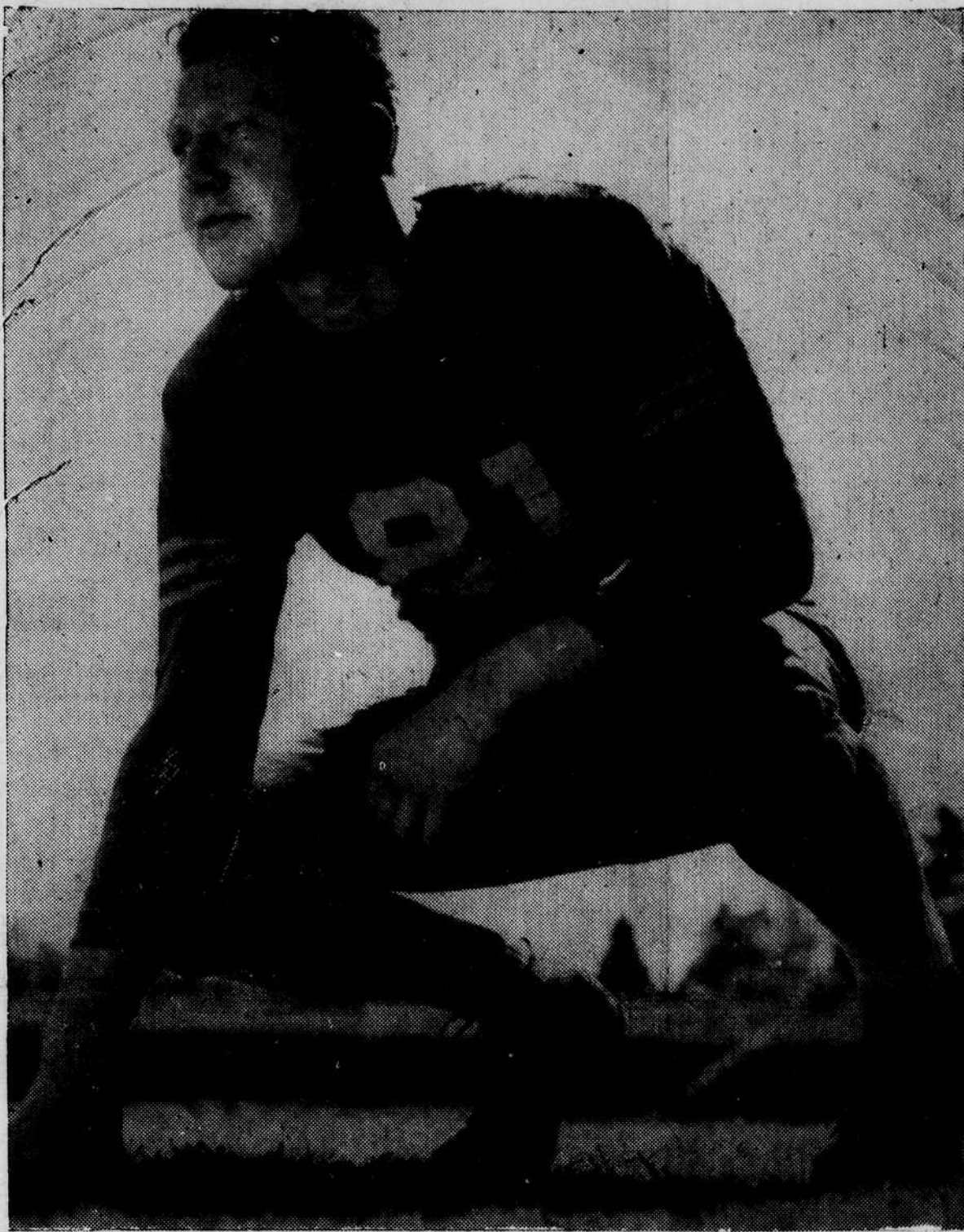

ROTC Companies To Continue Drill Instead of Class

ROTC companies will take advantage of the good weather and continue to drill, in place of military class instruction, until the rain begins, Col. Robert M. Lyon, ROTC head, stated yesterday.

Companies and squads were formed yesterday and new officers took over their duties. Gun instruction and target practice for freshmen will start soon. Drill, however, will be the main objective, and marching practice will be held as much as possible.

Plans for Armistice day observance have been completed and the ROTC unit will march as a regiment at that time. Forming at 13th and Kincaid, the cadets will meet the American Legion and other war veterans, whereupon the group as a whole will parade to McArthur court where a commemorative program will be held. Junior officers will wear their new uniforms for the first time on this occasion.

Old Oregon in Mail, On Campus Today

First regular issue of Old Oregon, monthly publication of the University of Oregon alumni association, will appear on the campus today. Although there has been one previous copy, the September issue, it was not distributed to students.

Action Likely On Exchange Dinner Plan

Question Expected To Be Up in House Chairman's Meet Next Week

Definite action on the proposed plan to reorganize the present exchange dinner system will probably be taken next week when the heads of women's houses and the social chairmen of the men's living organizations meet with Mrs. Hazel P. Schwering, dean of women, it was learned last night.

Although invitations have not yet been issued by Dean Schwering, it was understood that she intends to call a meeting of the heads of houses for 4 o'clock Wednesday to be followed by a meeting of the social chairmen at 4 Thursday.

Prexies Back Plan

The proposed plan, backed by such student leaders as Lorraine Hunt, president of Sigma Kappa, and Mary Ellen Williams, Zeta Tau Alpha's president, would substitute exchange dinners for deserts during winter, and perhaps, spring term.

When questioned last night, Mrs. Schwering confirmed the belief that the question is likely to come up in these two meetings. "It is entirely up to the houses what they wish to do. The dessert plan was originated during the depression in order to save on the costs that a dinner would naturally involve," she said.

Desserts Cost Less

Mrs. Schwering pointed out that the dinner plan would incur additional costs and would also require more time for the exchange. She also stated that it is much easier to get a good representation out to a dessert than to a dinner.

Meanwhile opinions of the presidents of various houses indicate a split on the question. Much discussion is taking place among the students with opinions pro and con being heard on all parts of the campus.

Although he is out of town, it was understood that Dr. Donald M. Erb, president of the University, will confer with the social chairman on the plan.

Lester Miller With Army at Presidio

Lester Miller, who put out the 1937-38 edition of the student directory, is taking a year's study with the regular army at the Presidio in San Francisco, according to a letter received by Professor W. F. G. Thacher.

Classes Out at 11:30 Today as Rally Spirit Invades Campus, City

Webfoot Grid Hopes Entrain for Palo Alto Today; Supporters Will Gather at Station To Cheer Pigskin Warriors

Classes which meet this morning at 11 to make up last Friday's 11 o'clocks will be dismissed at 11:30 for the rally parade, the student affairs committee decreed yesterday.

College football spirit threatens to take over the town today when the rally committee and the Monday Morning Quarterbacks put on their first joint parade and sendoff this morning at 11:30, when Webfoot football hopes entrain for Palo Alto.

Enthusiastic downtown supporters of Oregon football, spurred on by Baz Williams and Claire Kneeland, have collaborated with the campus committee to get together an automobile-truck caravan, at least three locomotive whistles, the University band, and countless raucous throats.

Safety Important

Taking unusual precautions to keep the parade free from accidents and from running afoul of the law, the rally committee has asked for the cooperation of students in observing a few special rules in traffic tomorrow.

Students are asked not to ride on the sides of cars on the way to the station. Two trucks at least will be provided to take all down to the train who turn out.

Council Urges Walk

It was originally sought by city authorities to have students walk down to the station to avoid the usual traffic entanglements, but due to the short time available to get downtown the rally committee felt this would be impossible.

The parade forms at the College Side at 11:30, and moves down Thirteenth to Pearl, north to Broadway, west to Willamette, and north to the Southern Pacific depot.

Exhibit Features USSR City Plan

Currently on exhibit in the "little art gallery" on the main floor in the art school is a group of drawings illustrating the Russian plan for building new cities and for making established cities more livable.

Designed by Alan Mather and edited by Talbot Faulkner Hamlin, the exhibit, entitled "Architecture and the Construction of Cities in the USSR," is being sent throughout the United States by the American Russian Institute.

The drawings are grouped into several divisions, each showing a specific phase. Several general maps show proposed changes in such cities as Moscow; others show plans for the water and sewer systems of the city, and still others show the proposed railway centers.

Barbara Baldinger Trains for Olympics

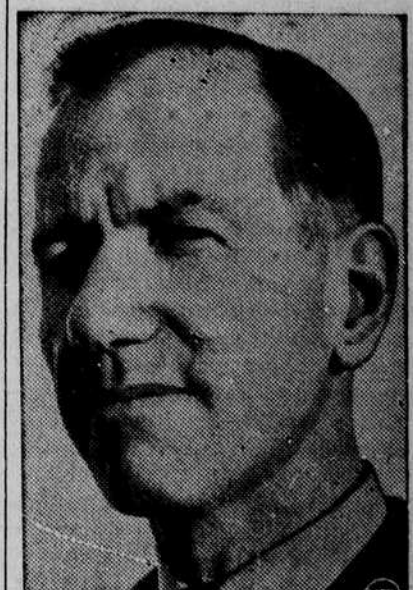
The games, formerly planned for Tokyo in 1940, are now scheduled for Helsinki. The tryouts from which the United States entrants will be chosen is the first hurdle that Barbara must conquer if she is to see Finland as a member of the United States swimming team.

Although Barbara did not enter any title meets last summer, she has, in the past, won the junior national 880-meter relay championship, 500-yard Southern Pacific Amateur Athletic union title, and the Hermosa 880-yard championship.

She received most of her early training in California where she swam for the Los Angeles athletic club for several years, training under her father, H. E. Baldinger, who is now a dairy specialist in Grants Pass.

To facilitate her training program, arrangements were made yesterday with the physical education department here to allow Barbara the use of the pool in Gerlinger for a certain period each day when no classes are in session.
