








The policy of the school, which has won it its national reputation, is a constant insistence upon high standards. This year the standard has been raised again, and in the term schedules for the present term there appeared for the first time the prerequisite: "Fifth Decile or Higher on Entrance English Examination." This means that students are not accepted unless they can start with a good control of the English language.

Good Placement Record One result of the school's policy is an excellent record for the placement of graduates. The large class that was graduated last June was almost entirely placed before the vacation was over, and a few days later the word went out that every girl who was waiting for a job had one; and all the boys except two whose specialties were different from the particular re-



'Frosh Prexy' Donald Erb


