An unconfirmed rumor appearing on the front page of the Oregon State Barometer yesterday indicated that the state board of higher education had decreed that no classes be held in any institution of the state system Armistice day.

Fearing that students would stage demonstrations demanding that they be allowed to attend classes that day, authorities attempted to conceal the report on the front page of the Barometer.
