Dominic Giovannini and Steve Fowler will fight it out as usual for the starting quarterback berth. Every game so far this season it has been a toss up as to the starter between these two very capable backs.

Bill Jensen, 200-pounder from Seattle, has been shifted back to his old position at right half. Jensen was shifted to blocking back earlier this week.

Warren stated last night that one of his toughest problems in picking the starting eleven was the left tackle berth. He has three men who are comparatively equal. Arnold Acheson, local Springfield star, Len Surles, ex-Bend high tackle, and Ed Moshofsky, big tackle from Beaverton, are probable starters at the position.

Ducks-Trojans Play First Northern Fray

Saturday will mark Southern California's first appearance at Multnomah stadium, Portland, against a University of Oregon team.

In the past all games between the two schools have been played in Los Angeles. Oregon has come out the loser on all but one occasion.

Up to last year's tilt, the Webfoots had been held scoreless in six consecutive games. The sensational offensive work of Troy's Amby Schindler was largely responsible for Oregon's defeat in that contest.
