Horn's Text Places Among 'Fifty Best'

Book Used in Comp Classes Here; Two Others Collaborate

An English composition textbook written by Dr. Robert D. Horn, professor of English, in collaboration with two other professors won a place among the 50 best books published in the United States last year, it was announced here Wednesday.

The distinction, seldom awarded to textbooks, was given in the annual Graphic Arts contest con. ducted by American book publishers. Dr. Horn's book, the only textbook to be placed on the award list, was judged among the best on format, typography, and content.

The textbook, "Creative Writing for College Students," was written by Dr. Horn, Professor Babcock of Wayne university and Professor-Robert English of Emory univer-... sity. Horn and Babcock, principal authors of the work, corresponded. for many years while preparing the manuscript. The prize-winning text, used in freshman composition courses here, was published by the American Book company. Dr. Horn said he has been asked to prepare another text but indicated that a heavy teaching load will probably prevent him from undertaking the task.




