There's no mystery about Oregon's two-game sweep of the Washington State series in Pullman. Not to the Webfoots anyway. "We ran h-ll out of 'em," they explain.

Here's a testimonial from Tubby Graves, freshman coach for the University of Washington, who scouted the Ducks in their second 57 to 31 win over the faltering

"Boy, oh, boy, how that Oregon team romped over WSC," said Graves, "I don't remember of ever having seen a northern division team with the caliber of Oregon's


