Forrest Twogood, the Idaho coach, who has a typical case of bursitis in his pitching wing, says, NIA, Berkeley, Feb. 15 .- (Special "I never did lose my stuff, I've got to Emerald)—The traveling Uniit now." Pain from the bursitis and a split biseps tendon stopped him. Otherwise you might right now be reading about a Pitcher Twogood of the Cleveland Indians.

What is bursitis? "What it really is," he says, "a fluid sack in your arm bursts." That takes away the arm's lubrication and causes the joint to have a gristle and feel sandy. Then it hurts. Twogie first injured his arm in 1927 when pitching for the University of Iowa. And he stuck it out for


