Bears Beaten Twice At Igloo in Thrillers

Championship Is First for University Since 1919 Season—Twenty Long Years; Scores Are 54 to 49 and 53 to 47

That's exactly how long the University of Oregon has had to wait for a second coast conference championship in basketball.

And Friday night, as the final gun clinched the coast title for the Webfoots, McArthur court was a bedlam. Over 6,000 wild fans "broke" an uproar that told a story of a deep satisfactions, of a great desire,

and of delirious joy. The Ducks had done it. They had battered a gallant California in 73/4 minutes rolled up to a 16team that found it hard-pressed point advantage. indeed to keep up with the dashing to 49 and 53 to 47.


