

Dr. James R. Jewell, head of the University department of education, and Dr. Verne Bain of the state department of education spoke at 11 o'clock yesterday in Guild hall on problems of teacher placement and certification in disembarked still far from her Oregon.


Dr. Jewell explained that the education department faculty has three distinct problems to deal with in preparing its students: graduation from college, certification by the state, and placement. No other school in the University has a placement bureau. And no placement bureau on the west coast has as high a percentage of placements as do Oregon and Oregon State.

"Perhaps," said Dr. Jewell. "the bureau could be more appropriately named the recommendation bureau for all we can do is recommend. Then if God, the placement ment bureau, and some school superintendent get the same whim at the same time, you are practically certain to land a job."






