Mrs. Phoebe Ellison Smith, wife of Dr. Warren D. Smith, head of the geology and geography departments, died at the Sacred Heart hospital early Tuesday morning.

In the past years Mrs. Smith has been active in both University and town affairs. She was a member of the University of Oregon Mother's club, the University of Oregon Women's faculty club, and the American Association of University Women, of which she was a past president. She had acted as both a member and chairman of the Eugene school board.

Besides her husband she is survived by a brother, Andrew W. Ellison of Cleveland, Ohio; two sons, James E. Smith of Oregon Z-City, and Warren E. Smith, a junior at the University of Oregon, and a daughter, Phoebe H. Smith, a junior at Eugene high school.


