Webfoots Score Twice On Passes

Smith-to-Graybeal Aerials Click In Bitter Struggle

(Continued from page one) them with the ball to his bosom and whirled around to scamper down the field.

Touchdown Pass Graybeal tossed a touchdown pass to Ted Horne on the four, and Ted crossed over to score six points. Jay converted the extra point. Nothing else happened in the way of scores in this half, but it was only the beginning of the excitement.

The third Beaver score came on the opening kick-off of the second half. Sure-footed Bob Olson tucked in Graybeal's kick on his own seven, and ran right through 11 Oregon players with only one player laying a hand on him to pay dirt, 93 yards away. "Cad" Cadenasso came the nearest to stopping him, on the 15.

Oregon State was ahead 10 points again, and that was too much for the Ducks. Again the passing combination supreme. Smith to Graybeal, clicked on the very first play after the kick-off. This time Bob faded back and threw a bulls-eye to Jay on the 50, and Jay pinned his eyes on the OSC goal posts, which never got out of his sight, to score a second touchdown in less than a minute.

Drive Bogs Down Again Oregon was within those three points of tying up the old ball game. Three points weren't very many, but they were enough of a lead for the Beavers to cling to. Once a sustained drive by the Oregon reserves went from the UO 20 clear down to the OSC 37, but a fifteen yard penalty for holding put them back on their own 44, and the drive bogged down.

The final two points of the ball game were made possible by a gambling Webfoot team who elected to pass from behind their own goal line with one and one-half minutes to play. Graybeal made a desperate attempt to throw the ball to an Oregon man, with six OSC giants swarming him, and he finally succumbed to Mother Earth, behind his own goal.

OSC Backfield Strong The underrated Oregon State backfield showed a splendid running attack, featured by the tremendous driving power of Jim Kisseburgh and "Rowdy" Dow, Jim's understudy who showed the most drive of any back on the field. Dow was always good for three or four yards every time he leaned forward. Kisseburgh was a bear on defense when he was in there.

A bigger, faster charging line made the difference in the two teams. End Leovich, Tackle Bill Sears, Guard Younce, and Center Tsoutsouvas were outstanding in the Orange line. Bob Smith played his demon game of defense for Oregon, and so did Chet Haliski.

Michigan State Bows to Broncos Of Santa Clara

Southern California is one step nearer another conference championship, with the ensuing Rose Bowl bid, following its overwhelming victory over Stanford, Saturday, by a score of 33 to 0.

The Trojans, in giving Stanford one of the worst lickings in many years, cleaned the bench of reserves as Howard Jones gave the veterans a rest in the second half.

Flashing power that has carried them to the top of the heap, men of Troy mixed deadly passing with their ground attack to complete the rout of the Indians.

University of Oregon's vaunted passing attack clicked twice for touchdowns, but that was not enough to overcome the drives of the determined Beavers of Oregon State, and Oregon's homecoming celebration was marred by a 19-10 loss.

Stater Line Strong The Staters' forward wall halted the drives of the Ducks, killing many running plays before they were started. The game may be summed up in a few words: Too much Kisseburgh in the Oregon State backfield, and too much Oregon State line. The Beavers made a nice comeback after the previous week's loss to Southern California.

The Washington Huskies continued on the victory path after a dismal early season start. California was unable to solve the Washington passing and lost its fourth conference game, 13 to 6.

Neither team was able to push the ball across the opponent's goal line... all scores coming on passes.

Washington State dads were given a hair-raising thrill as the Cougars won over an unusually tough Idaho team. The Pullman squad, although favored to win, had a few bad moments as a fighting Vandal eleven staged a last half rally that fell just short in the closing minutes of the contest with the Cougars winning, 21 to 13.

Michigan State forced the tough Santa Clara team to the limit before bowing to the favored Broncos, 6 to 0, in an intersectional clash at San Francisco. The Broncos marched 62 yards to the only score of the game early in the first period. After that, the game developed into a scoreless struggle.

Beta, Kappa Sig, Phi Delt Squads Post Triumphs

In league I, the Betas cinched their lead with a 6-to-0 victory over Sigma Chi, Kappa Sigma took a firm grasp on the league IV title by defeating the Phi Psi, 6 to 0; and the Phi Delt's dropped the Fijis, 8 to 0, leaving only a bare mathematical chance for another team to cop the league III pennant.

Sigma Chi received the opening kick-off but quickly lost possession when the Betas intercepted. Going to the 10, the Betas lost the ball on downs after a missed pass behind the goal line.

Craig passed to Brayton for the Beta score in the second half. Throughout the game, the Betas were able to dope out the Sigma Chi pass plays in advance, but apparently lacked the necessary scoring punch.

In the first half, Bob McAuliffe threw to J. Lansing to run up the only score of the Kappa Sig-Phi Psi clash.

A blocked punt in the last few minutes of the game nearly led to another Kappa score, but a fumble and an interception halted the drive.

The Phi Psi started clicking with a minute to go and moved down to the Kappa Sig 20 where the horn sounded.

Line Play Features Excellent line play was largely responsible for the Kappa Sig victory; punt after punt was blocked.

The only thing now on top of the Kappa Sigma team is a rooter's lid apiece.

Although handicapped by a pledge walkout, losses including First-string Center Harry Burdick, the Phi Delt's scored one touchdown and got a break with a safety to hand the Fijis their third defeat.

The Phi Delt's climaxed a drive to the Fiji ten with a pass from Blanchard to Stafford for the only touchdown.
