According to Dr. Fred N. Miller, health service head, laboratory tests of suspected food will continue to be conducted in an effort to determine the exact source of the organisms responsible for such an illness, so that precautions can be taken against

Dr. Miller stated that such an illness as was contracted by the four boys was not too common a thing, neither was it extremely serious. However, it did cause a great deal of uncomfortable feeling, he said.
