Now that Honest John Warren's mighty frosh basketball aggregation has discarded its "war" togs after winning 16 games in 17 starts, it's time we pay our respects to the coaching ability of the portly Duckling mentor.

Sixty-six wins and only 12 defeats in five years as frosh cage headman at the Igloo—that's Honest John's record, and it's some record, even if Warren says it isn't.

Included in this total of 66 victories are 13 triumphs over the Oregon State rooks in 20 games between the two teams. What's more, four of those seven black marks were written on the books last year when Warren was robbed, by ineligibility, of his premier stars.

This year the frosh lost only one game . . . and that, gentlemen, is just a good frosh season! . . . Whenever one of Warren's clubs loses more than two games, it is virtually a major catastrophe!

1936 was the year Bobby Anet and Wally Johansen, John's two high school proteges from Astoria; Laddie Gale, then a green kid from Oakridge; and Busher Smith

formed the nucleus of the frosh club. Archie Marshik, Earl Sandness, and Red McNeely, present varsity stars, were John's aces in his most successful year as yearling coach, 1938, when his club won 17 games without suffering a single setback.

John's frosh record is darned impressive any way you look at it, but his 12-year coaching mark is nothing short of remarkable. . . . Some coach in the United States might possibly have a better one, but you'd have to prove it to me before I'd believe it.

In seven years as Astoria high mentor, Warren and his Fishermen won 325 games while losing just a mere 23. Now that really is something, when you consider his clubs played about 50 contests a year, against the state's best teams.

Twelve University of Oregon swimmers, Coach Russ Cutler, and Manager Jimmy Selders, departed at 7 this morning for Seattle in quest of the northern division championship meet, held at the University of Washington pool, Saturday, March 2.

Cutler took every available varsity man to use against the cream of the northern division crop, the Huskies, Washington State, Idaho, and Oregon State. The Oregon mentor said he planned to use different men in each event as much as possible.

The Ducks, winners of the northern division dual meet championship, have, with the exception of the Huskies, swamped most competition this season. Oregon barely edged out Washington 43 to 32 in an early season dual meet.

Swim fans have the championship meet predicted as an Oregon-Washington dual affair, with the Webfoot mermen slight favorites.

Oregon swimmers have traveled many miles this season, and if the present trend of surprising support of the "march of dimes" continues, Jack Dallas, Sherm Wetmore, and Jerry Macdonald will add more miles to their travels with a trip
