'Welcome Book' Wants Comments

Dean Stafford Welcomes Critics Of Oregon's Freshman Guide Copy Now Being Prepared

A call for criticism and suggestions for the 1940-41 edition of the University of Oregon "Welcome Book" was issued yesterday by O. F. Stafford, chairman of the Freshman Week committee.

Copy for the forthcoming edition of the handbook, which has gained a national reputation as a pacemaker in the field of printed guides for entering college students, is now being prepared. Anyone who wishes to read the copy or offer suggestions for the booklet may do so by calling at the office of Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel, in Johnson hall.

"We will welcome any constructive suggestions on the handbook that will make it more acceptable and useful, and serve its purpose better," Dean Stafford said.

The "Welcome Book" serves the same purpose that "Freshman Bibles" serve on other campuses. It is an introduction to life at Oregon, and offers the new student information on registration, rush week, preliminary examinations, and activities.

Because it is sent to everyone who applies for admission, the handbook has received a wide circulation. A number of letters received in the dean of personnel's office indicate that many Eastern educators are patterning their information booklets after it.

"One of the most outstanding guides ever published," was the comment received from Columbia university, after a survey of booklets from many schools had been completed by that institution.

Robert H. Galloway Ex-Emerald Head. Succumbs; Age 33

Word was received last night of the death of Robert H. Galloway in West Plains, Missouri. Galloway was managing editor of the Emerald in 1928.

After leaving Oregon, he became managing editor of the Klamath Falls Herald and also worked on the Klamath Falls Basin Progress. In 1934 he managed the publicity campaign for Charles H. Martin in the gubernatorial race of that year.

Galloway was 33 years old and had been working in West Plains for one year. He was affiliated with Alpha Tau Omega fraternity.

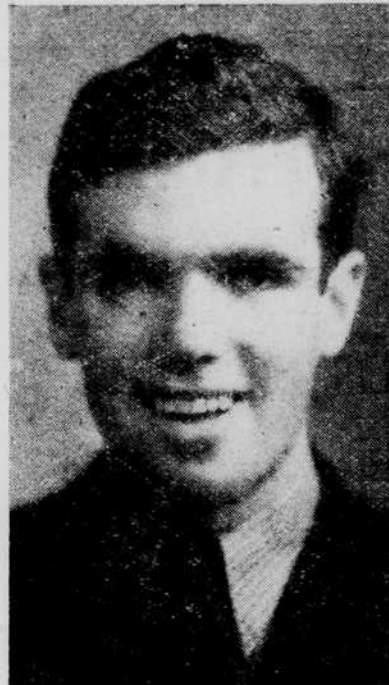
