

# DUCK TRACKS

Just one more man—a quarter-miler good enough to turn in a :50 flat 440—that's all Colonel Bill Hayward needed to bring Oregon another track victory over Oregon State.



But, sadly enough, no such athlete could be found on the 1940 roster, and the Beavers won their first meet from the Ducks in eight years, 70 to 61.

Picture the situation. A close meet, victory riding on the outcome of the relay. The Beavers leading, 65 to 61, and no relay men (Hayward has no capable runners who specialize in the 440.)

Colonel Bill was never a man to give up without a struggle, however. He walked over to Jim Buck, his favorite "laughing boy." Sprinter Buck had just scored a triple, winning the century, 220-yard dash, and the 220-yard low hurdles, and was pulling on his sweat clothes.

Hayward opened his mouth, started to speak. But he never said a word. Buck beat him to the punch. "I know," he grinned. "You want me to run a 440 in the relay." Off came the sweat clothes.

Storli's Gallant Try  
Kirman Storli, Oregon's captain, also needed no persuasion. A regular half-miler, he had scored twice, winning the 440 and setting a new Oregon-Oregon State dual meet record in his specialty, the 880. Storli would run the anchor lap. The other two men would be Ed Reiner and Les Clever, the regular quarter-milers. Neither had placed, however, in this event earlier in the day.

Clever ran first, losing some 15 yards. Buck took up from there, cutting the Orange lead to 5 yards. Reiner, Oregon's third man, nullified Buck's gain, and Storli received the baton some 15 yards behind Oregon's State's Tom Blair. The powerful Storli closed the gap, but the advantage was too great. Blair won by about five yards.

In summary, Oregon's seniors, especially Buck and Storli, came through with Herculean, heroic performances. They kept Oregon in the running all afternoon . . . and they showed a fighting spirit

that drew comment from Hayward.

**Mitchell's Comeback**  
Bob Mitchell, for instance, was badly outclassed in the mile, failing to place. He came back, however, to virtually run his conqueror, Don Vaillancourt of the Beavers, into the ground in a brilliant two-mile run.

Boyd Brown, as expected, won the javelin; Rod Hansen placed first in the pole vault; and Storli and Buck were the stars of the meet.

The Ducks lost costly points in the discus as Bill Regner placed third, behind Bill Blackledge and Eberle Schultz of OSC, and in (Please turn to page six)

Asphalt courts or not, Larry Key played steady tennis to outlast Washington's Loqvam, 9-7, 6-4, but Bob Potwin and Bob Horning lost their singles matches to Geogahan and Peterson, both by straight set scores.

The Huskies walked away with both doubles watches, Clark and Key losing to Page and Loqvam, 6-3, 7-5, while Horning and Werschkul dropped a tough match to Peterson and Ravenscroft, 6-3, 3-6, 6-3.

Today the varsity will tangle with Oregon State on the University courts at 2:30 in another conference dual meet.

## Duckling Nine Rout Orange Babes, 13-4

Continuing a hitting barrage, which saw them rap out 18 hits in the first game of the frosh-rook series, the Ducklings hammered a pair of Oregon State yearling pitchers for a 13 to 4 win in a slow encounter at Howe field Saturday.

Bob Rehberg, freshman fireballer, seemed just wild enough to be effective, giving up only 3 hits and one run in the five innings he worked. He kept the rooks from scoring until the third, when Sherwood was safe as Don Kirsch booted a slow hopper. Sherwood went to second on Harvey's single left, and took third on a passed ball. He galloped home a few moments later when Heinenon slapped a double to center.

### Burns Scores

Hank Burns, Oregon lead-off man, drove a double into center to open the Ducklings' half of the first. Kirsch walked and John Bubalo beat out a bunt to fill the bases. Tony Crish grounded to deep short and Burns scampered home with the first run. Then Chuck Clifford singled through the box, scoring Kirsch and Bubalo. He stole second and tallied on Howard Robertson's single past second. Howard Robertson stole second and scored on a single to right by Rehberg.

Yackey, starting pitcher for

the rooks, tightened down in the next three innings, allowing only one frosh hit. In the fifth canto the Ducklings found him for five more hits and a trio of runs. They scooted across another in the seventh without a hit, and in eighth tallied four more on four hits.

### Rehberg Replaced

Nick Begleries replaced Rehberg at the beginning of the sixth and was greeted with a pair of singles and one run. The rooks scored one run in the eighth, and one in the ninth on a single hit. Begleries struck out five.

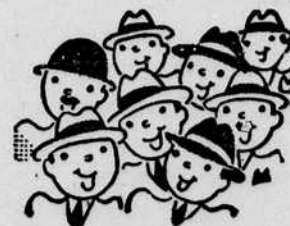
## Fizzed Picnic Set For Wednesday
