ASUO Offers Bargain on Athletic Cards

House Going 100% To Receive ^Money Order, Gurley Says

Oregon's first athletic card drive moved forward Tuesday with the establishment of a ticket booth in front of the College Side where the money-saving cards will be on sale until Thursday night. The drive, headed by Joe Gurley, offers a \$23.85 value of all University games for \$9. This includes five football games, 11 basketball tilts, two conference track meets, 13 baseball contests and three swimming meets.

In addition, there will be a \$1.10 discount on tickets to the Oregon-Oregon State game at Corvallis on November 30.

To enable early purchases an installment plan has been devised whereby a \$3 down payment may be made. The full payment, however, will give the purchaser \$1 credit on the Oregana, University yearbook, Gurley announced.
