

Howard Jones' Trojans did a lot of mousing around in and about midfield last Saturday, but rammed up against blank walls when they attempted to barrel through the Webfoot barrier near the goal. However, stymied on the ground, they threw out aerial feelers and connected twice. Not until midway through the third period did USC muster up scoring punch, and it was that Peoples "guy" again. 


