
3. Appointed Frances Cox and Gloria Difford to organize the student body office force.







Starting at 7:30 p.m., the lecture will be illustrated with slides.

This is the same speech that Professor Willcox gave to a large group in the Portland art museum, a week and a half ago.

According to faculty members of the University architecture school, the talk in Portland received wide publicity and Professor Willcox is repeating his lecture at the insistent requests of many Oregon students and Eugene townspeople.

Sullivan was the first prominent architect to break away from the conventional methods of copying old European architecture styles.
