The board of governors of the Amateur Athletic union must be feeling the nearness of Christmas and the giving spirit. That's really tough considering that all he got in return for the loss of the privilege of playing under the AAU was \$7500. Yes, \$7500 was known what it's like. But somebody said Bill Dunlap was terrific.

Personally, I could stand to miss basketball games for several years if someone would tuck some greenbacks of that size in my pocket. But what I fail to comprehend is why Wintermute and Gale were not granted a similar reinstatement. Both had applied for such a reinstatement at the time of Luisetti's plea.

Their cases are nearly identical. All three were named all-American, they turned pro, and they wanted to be reinstated by the AAU. Gale and Wintermute were turned down. Possibly, it was because Slim only made \$1500 in his year with the Detroit Eagles and because Laddie only received \$1000 for less than a season with the same team.

On the other hand, Luisetti was paid the above amount to help make a basketball picture for the movies. However, all three were considered pros. Maybe the governors feel that Gale and Wintermute haven't been punished enough. Maybe after they make five or six thousand more bucks apiece, the AAU bigwigs will feel that their punishment has been sufficient, that the time has come for them to be made supremely happy by being allowed to play again under the AAU.

Duke Iverson can back up the line along with Chet Haliski—possibly. So can Roy Ell. At fullback—well—Dyer played there. Stuart (Butch) Nelson was second string this year. Ell knows what it's like. But somebody said Bill Dunlap was terrific. He's a jaysee transfer and has been bothered with an injury, but if it's okeh by next spring, the rest of the team will know he's around.

As for a leader, that's something again. Nelson might do it. He barks out the signals in such a way that it helps to shake off the lethargic feeling of some of the players. Roblin could be the leader, or maybe the frosh ranks of this year contain one. The team so far has been considered without the frosh (sophs to be). Most of them are unknown quantities and must prove themselves in spring practice.
