

During 1940, city charters drawn up by the bureau of municipal research and service were adopted by four Oregon cities, it was revealed Friday by Herman Kehrli, director.

The charters embody a new principle, the general grant of powers under home rule, which supplants the specific enumeration of powers, and which are drafted to omit material covered by state law or which could be enacted by ordinance rather than by charter.


The voters of Bandon, Independence, Silverton, and Union have adopted the new "streamlined" charters which make it unnecessarv to return the document to the voters in cases of changes unforeseen when the old charter was written. The new type of charter provides greater flexibility in city government it is said, and makes possible the combination of the duties of administrative officers when desirable.

The new form of charter was first recommended by the bureau in 1934 when it was incorporated in a charter adopted by the city of Huntington. Its adoption in 1940 by four cities is considered a significant development by university bureau members.


