Dance tickets for students are \$1.75 a couple, with 500 of them made available at the start of the week. As soon as the 500 are sold, the cost will jump to \$2 to equal the admittance charge for out-

The concert-stage show admission price is 50 cents, lowest ever charged for a complete Kay Kyser appearance. Student body tickets must be shown at the door, as cost for outsiders is 75 cents. Student body cards must also be presented at the dance.


