# Dr. Raver to Tell Of Power Work

## Bonneville Dam Expert Speaks Here April 10

Dr. Paul J. Raver, administrator of the Bonneville project, will be the third speaker on the student-faculty assemblies at the University of Oregon when he gives a featured address open to townspeople Thursday morning, April 10, at 11 o'clock in Gerlinger hall.

Born at Logansport, Indiana, Raver was graduated in civil engineering from the University of

Nebraska in 1917, received a degree of master of business administration from Northwestern university in 1927, and a degree of doctor of philosophy from Northwestern in 1933.

In 1933 Dr. Raver became supervisor of the section of rates and research of the Illinois Commerce commission, organizing the section and directing special research on such subjects as revenues, rates, cost of capital, corporate relations, rate of return, securities, and related economic and financial subjects.
