Event to Feature Special Displays, New Brooks Room

Special displays and exhibits, supplementing the library's own collections, will highlight the University of Oregon's "Library Day," May 3, M. H. Douglass, university librarian, announced here Saturday.

Sponsored this year by the Association of Patrons and Friends of the University Library, the annual event will feature the dedication of the Brooks Memorial room, the preceding evening. Mrs. Lester R. Brooks, mother of the late Philip Ranny Brooks for whom the room is named, provided funds for the gift, including construction of the room and the 2000 volumes it will house.

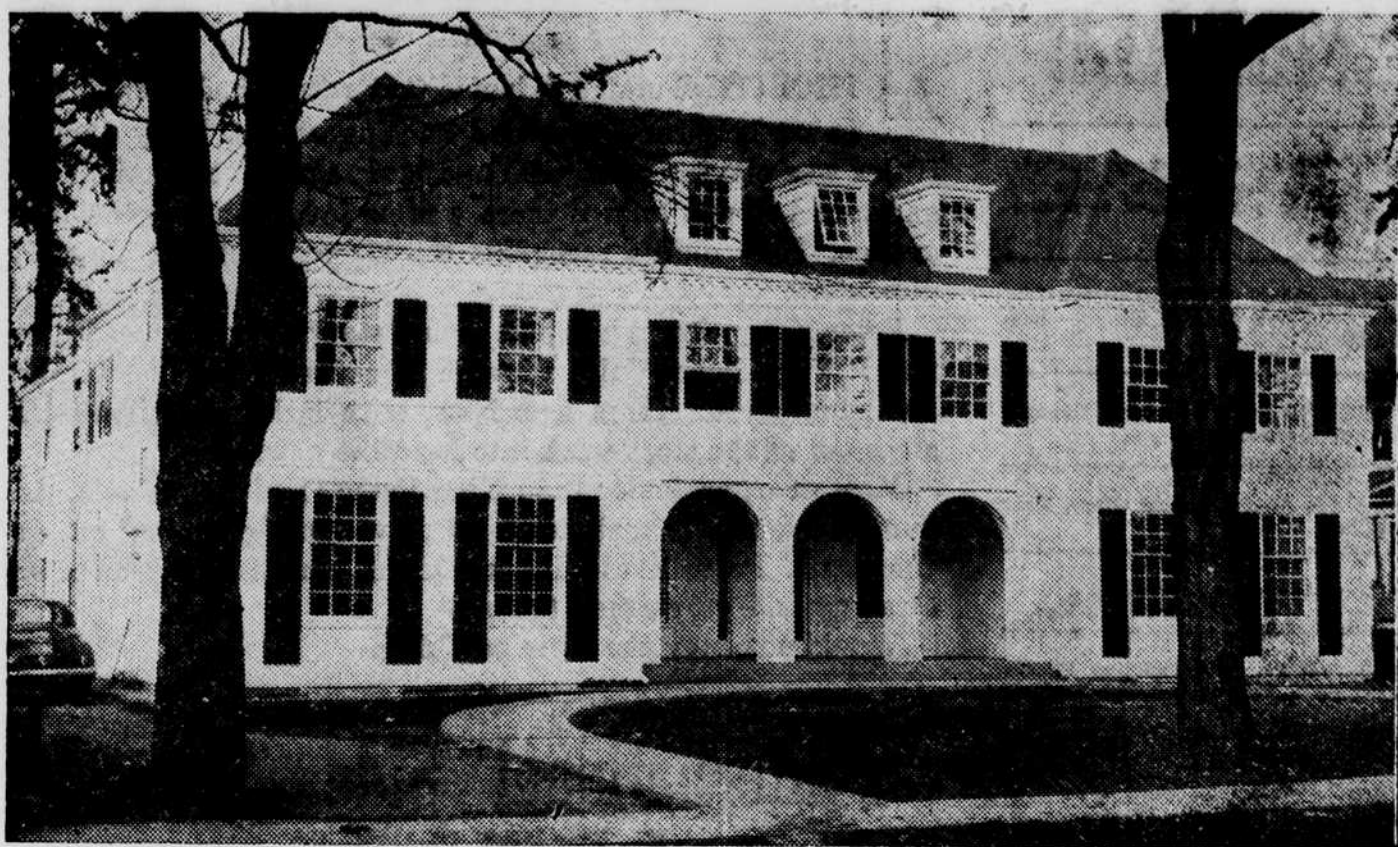
Libraries of several student living organizations will be on display as will some of the entries in the contest for the best personal student library. Among the library's collections of books to be on display are the Burgess collection of old and rare books, the Homer Memorial collection, Barker collection of 19th century authors, and John Henry Nash loan collection of fine printing.

One of the outstanding private collections to be shown is that of Capt. James D. Basey, U. S. Army, retired. The collection numbers 791 volumes and periodicals on military and naval history.

Haig Praises University UW President Visits

"Your University has the reputation of having one of the best student governments of any school on the coast, with the exception of Stanford," personable Neil Haig, president of the University of Washington student body, told ASUO president "Tiger" Payne Monday.

Haig spent the day on the Oregon campus as part of a tour of coast universities. His purpose is to inquire into the different forms of student government in an attempt to find the best type to apply at Washington where reorganization is now underway.

Surprised at the part played by politics in Oregon student government, Haig remarked, "Politics don't enter into the government picture at Washington. We haven't anything to resemble the interfraternal rivalry or bloc system found at Oregon."

Haig also expressed amazement at the seeming amount of faculty control found in Oregon campus government.

The visitor was very pleased with the beauty of the University grounds, the millrace, and the friendly attitude of the students. He plans to return Monday or Tuesday to confer with the executive council and to gather more extensive data on governmental organization at the University.
