Latest Figures Tell Decrease

Spring Enrollment Shows Slight Loss Over Last Year's

A breakdown of registration figures released recently showed a total enrollment in the University of 3249 students, a one per cent decrease from last spring term's figure of 3280.

The 1949 men enrolled led the 1300 women by a wide margin. The men, however, have decreased three per cent from last year's 2011 while the women have increased two per cent over the 1269 registered at the same time last year.

Raver to Cover Power History

Bonneville Project Head to Address Students Thursday

The history and administration of federal power will be covered by Paul J. Raver, administrator of the Bonneville project, when he addresses University students at their 11 o'clock assembly Thursday in Gerlinger hall.

Dr. Raver has had rare experience in the field of public works; an imposing list of offices in this line follows his name. From the time he was graduated as an engineer in 1917 until today, his whole career has been devoted to public service.

It was this record which led Secretary Ickes to ask that he be released in 1939 from his newly appointed station as chairman of the Illinois commerce commission to become head of the power for the Grand Coulee and Bonneville projects.

Long years of work in the field of public works has equipped him with a fine understanding of problems.
