Fete Queen, '41 Model, Hails From Lei-Land

From Hawaii, the "loveliest fleet of islands anchored in any ocean," some 3,000 miles from Eugene across surging expanses of blue Pacific came a dazzlingly beautiful girl, with brown silken tresses and fathomless walnut eyes to rule over an Oregon campus gone Arabian during Junior Weekend—Annabelle Dow . . . She didn't know then that one day those tears would be more than compensated for, that among other things, she would be No. 1 personage on the campus during the University's most celebrated weekend.

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Queen to Launch 'Norwind'

Temporarily exchanging her traditional royal canoe for the seagoing craft "Norwind," Queen Annabelle Dow will head Eugene's big "Navy Day" parade at 7:30 next Tuesday evening.

In honor of Chet "Noah" Good and his big boat, the entire Junior weekend delegation, including her majesty, princesses, and committee heads will be on hand. A milk-christening program preceding the caravan, which will include about 50 boats, is to be presided over by the royal party.

Abandoning the thematic oriental melodies for the duration of the parade, music will be supplied by the University of Oregon and Eugene high school bands. The good boat, which will carry the queen, will be followed by smaller craft holding her royal princesses.

Cameramen from national news picture services and magazines are being detailed to make a picture record of the unique celebration, and the police department,

fire department, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the American Legion, are to be included in the parade.

The royal party will also be guests of honor in the long Wednesday caravan which will take the good ship "Norwind" to its launching place in Mapleton, Oregon. Taking part in the evening clambake at the coast, the University delegation is expected to add an Arabian flavor to the coast party.
