

Studio Seeks College Song

Contest Will Select Number for Movie 'Campus Rhythm'

Since production on "Campus Rhythm" begins on June 6, all entries must be at the Hal Roach studios (addressed to Ruth Burch) before midnight of Wednesday, May 28, 1941, and announcement of winners will be made as soon thereafter as possible.
