

### Radio Workshop To Present Drama

Next Thursday evening the University Radio Workshop will present a drama, entitled "And Their Dreams Came True." It will be broadcast from the campus over KOAC during the regular student hour from 7:30 to 8:30.

The play is a story of the founding of the University of Oregon. Judge Deady, then president of the board of regents, made the first commencement address in Deady hall. Excerpts from this speech will be used in the play. The story traces the development of a university and carries the audience through the first session of school. There were 80 students registered at that time. Some of the first rules of the campus will be mentioned.

Berniece Frenetovich, a transfer from Marylhurst college, will sing several operatic numbers. Wallace Bullard will accompany her at the piano and also play several solo numbers.

A number of Columbia Workshop plays will be broadcast from time to time over this student hour.

### Practice Called For Hoopsters




