

Defense Prompts Extension to Offer Additional Courses

To serve the many Oregon students who have been caught in the draft or who are planning naval or aviation careers, the general extension division is offering three new courses, which may be taken for credit.

A two-hour course in trigonometry covering the elements needed by men in aviation, artillery, and in various phases of the navy is one of the featured courses. Another is elementary algebra, comparable to math 10 on the campus, a course planned for those who have had no high school training in mathematics or for those who would like to review.

High school students are encouraged by the extension division to enroll in courses which will give them valuable background for their college careers. Up to 60 hours may be earned toward a degree by correspondence courses. Group requirements may be fulfilled by planning the courses accordingly, extension officials point out.

The extension division provided courses for 1814 students last year. Courses were sent all over the state with every county represented.

Officials of the educational activities board were forced to turn down the petition, which would call for an expenditure which, when extended to all 48 living organizations would come to \$1200.

Al Hunt, secretary-treasurer of the I.C. said yesterday, "House bills have not been raised to take care of the expenses incurred by every alum who comes down and stays at the houses. What the fraternities are trying to do is get away from the high expenses for entertainment."
