

## UO Rifle Unit Seen in Future

With permission to use the Igloo for extra practice sessions granted, hopes looked high Thursday for an Oregon rifle drill unit.

Colonel R. M. Lyon, head of the military department, announced that Company A, under the leadership of Captain Harvey Blythe and Cadet Captain Ted Lindley will drill two hours each Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock in McArthur court.

The company hopes to be able to present a variety of snappy military stunts at half time during home basketball games and Captain Blythe told the men Thursday that there is a possibility of a trip to Portland for the Armistice day game with Santa Clara.

As soon as the necessary equipment arrives the company will be ready to appear in their regular ROTC uniforms plus white gloves and colorful shoulder ornaments.

remarked, "but as soon as the war's over I want to come to an American college and study aeronautical engineering."

the Spanish Civil war, having covered the former for North American Newspaper alliance and the latter for the Chicago Tribune. Mr. Allen is now at work on a two-volume book entitled, "The History of Foreign Intervention in the Spanish Civil War."

Allen was active on the University campus during the early 1920's and worked for a time on the Eugene Morning Register. Later he joined the staff of the Portland Oregonian, where he got his start in political news writing. He spent his early life in Seattle and later attended the University of Washington.

## Interviewed Notables

Allen interviewed Marshall Pilsudski in Vilna, Prince Carol and Magda Lupescue during their exile in Paris, Alfonso XIII as he fled the throne of Spain, and Primo de Rivera as he awaited execution in Alicante prison. He splashed through the muddy Spanish battlefields to get the right "coloring" for his dispatches and battled strict censorship during the present world conflict to get his reports sent from overseas.
