UO Musicians To Attend Meet

The University music school will be represented at the Northwest Music Educators' conference in Salem Saturday, October 24, by Miss Maude Garnett, assistant professor of public school music. A string chamber orchestra conducted by Rex Underwood, professor of music, will also attend.

Miss Garnett will speak Saturday morning on songs and rhythms for the primary grades.

Group Offers Three Awards

Pi Lambda Theta, national association of women in education, has announced three awards of \$250 each to be made from the Ella Victoria Dobbs fellowship fund for significant research studies in education. They will be granted on or before September 15, 1943. The subject for paper is "Professional Problems of Women."

The study may be submitted by any woman of graduate standing or any member or group of members whether engaged in educational work at present or not, but it must be an unpublished report. It may deal with any aspect of the topic.

The report will not become the property of Pi Lambda Theta, nor will subsequent publication be restricted in any way. Three copies of the final report of completed research study shall be submitted to the committee on studies and awards by June 1, 1943.
