

## Auto Owners Must Register

Immediate response by student car owners who have not yet reported their license numbers is urged by O. L. Rhinesmith, automobile registration officer, who recently was requested by the enforcement committee to impound cars not fully registered.

All students who drive cars are not aware of campus regulations, said Mr. Rhinesmith, who submitted the following list compiled by the state board of education:

### Rules

1. All motor vehicles in the possession or control of students must be registered immediately with the enforcement officer who will issue a sticker which must at all times be attached to the windshield.

2. No student may drive a motor vehicle, either his own or that of another person, unless said student shall have registered himself at the automobile office.

### Report

3. Every acquisition, change of title or change of license number of a motor vehicle must be reported immediately to the automobile office and a new sticker obtained and placed on the windshield.

4. All state and city traffic regulations must be observed at all times.

5. Permission to drive a motor vehicle will be withdrawn in every case where it plays a detrimental part in a student's scholarship, conduct, social life, or general welfare.

## UO Receives Annual Funds

This University and the five other institutions of higher learning in Oregon will receive only 62.8 per cent maintenance funds coming from direct appropriation of the legislature, according to Willard L. Marks, president of the state board of higher education.

This statement was made in the annual budget which has just been compiled in final form.

Income derived from the appropriated funds of the state decreased 3.3 per cent during the past decade while enrollment increased 22.9 per cent for the same period," President Marks stated.
